# Scream against war, torture and occupation

It has become clear that the British and American governments are guilty of serious abuses in Iraq. A leaked report from the International Committee of the Red Cross contradicts George Bush's assertion that Abu Grahib had merely been a scene of "disgraceful conduct by a few American troops." The ICRC director of communications, Pierre Kraehenbuchel insisted that there was "a broad pattern, not individual acts, there was a pattern and a system." Furthermore the occupying have not improved humanitarian situation, and the number of Iragi civilians killed is estimated to be between 9,921 and 11,071.

In response to the atrocities, and to the overall disaster of the occupation, activists from the Cambridge Action Network (C.A.N.) organised a Scream against War, Occupation and Torture. On Thursday 20th May activists from this group along with other residents from Cambridge met outside the Town Hall in market square at 1.30 pm. Kristina Weaver, an activist who had participated in a collective scream before, explained the action to the group and to onlookers. The group then linked arms and stood in an outward facing circle. The group screamed for one minute, and then finished to applause from people who had stopped to watch. Kristina said that the purpose of the scream was to "give people a space to express feelings about war and torture, feelings that are too complex and intense sometimes to be captured by words." She also aimed to make a "creative and confrontational statement about the silence of the US and UK governments in response to the ongoing atrocities." II people turned up to participate, 2 of whom had joined when leaflets were handed out 15 minutes earlier. Local press (Q103 and the Cambridge Evening News) came to report on the action. The scream also provided publicity for an emergency demonstration



called by the Stop the War coalition in London on Saturday May 22nd.

The demonstration in London started at II am at the Embankment and proceeded to Trafalgar Square. The size of the march is believed to have been between 2,500 and 3,000. A participant in the march has written that the march was 'all in all a great experience given the situation. In less than two weeks a demonstration of this size would be impossible but for the email lists and the general networking of so many people." Later that day there was a protest against the Rafah massacre outside downing street which ended in a sitdown at Whitehall.

The Stop the War coalition has called for a day of local action on June 30th to coincide with the so called "handover of power" to the Iragis.

### Forum on Software **Patents**

The European Union is currently introducing legislation which will extend patent law to cover computer programs. The Foundation for a Free Information Infrastructure (FFII) is one of many organisations opposing this move, saying it will stifle innovation and force programmers to worry about whether they could be prosecuted for writing computer programs.

James Heald of the FFII will give a talk entitled "Software Patents: a Danger for Innovation." Local MEPs and other competing candidates in the European elections on 10 June will attend this forum and will give statements as to their position on this issue. There is a possibility of a second speaker who will take a propatents position. Afterwards, the talk and discussion will be available as video and fax Tony Blair, Jack Straw and the Israeli audio streams on Cambridge IndyMedia
